For Inmates

Victim Empathy Programme (VEP): A restorative programme that helps prisoners understand the ripple effect of their crime on victims and their families.

#### Aftercare

(for released male & female ex-offenders)

Aftercare activities commence at the prison gate on the day of an inmate's release. When requested by an inmate, he/she will be met by volunteers and/or staff at the time of his/her release ("Prison Gate Ministry). The ex-offender will then be followed up through a journeying process which include support in the areas of skills upgrading, job placements and financial aid, etc. The objective of Aftercare is to journey with the ex-offender as he/she re-integrates into the society.

For Family Members of Inmates and ex-offenders

We partner with churches, volunteers, and organisations to bring love and support to families of inmates to break the inter-generational cycle of offending. Through programmes designed to help the affected adults, youth and children, we hope to assist in the strengthening of the family units and providing an environment that is conducive for reconciliation of inmates and ex-offenders to their family members, and their eventual re-integration into society. Practical support for inmates' families include medical visits, escorts to visit inmates in prison, social assistance referral and case management, financial aid, educational programmes forchildren, educational bursary and outings for children and family members.

A landmark film project between National Volunteer & Philanthropy Centre (NVPC), local film company Blue3Asia and 15 Singaporean film-makers, "15 Shorts" showcases lesser-told stories of everyday Singaporean heroes from the 1970s to the 1990s, in support of 15 charities.

Director Chai Yee Wei's short film "Sister" was dedicated to 70x7. "Sister" tells the story of Roman Catholic nun Sister Gerard Fernandez, who became a death row counnsellor after Catherine Tan was sentenced to hang. Catherine Tan was one of the two holy wives of the infamous Adrian Lim - a spirit medium whose outrageous story of sex, rituals, and rites shocked the entire nation.

# VOLUNTEER PARTNERSHIP & ENGAGEMENT

### PLANS FOR 2019

As more opportunities are being presented to PFS to reach out to beneficiaries with pro-social, non-religious activities, 70x7 will focus on raising sufficient funds to finance these activities in 2019.

## Review Of Financial State And Explanation Of Major Financial Transactions:

70x7 recorded a net surplus of \$97,020 for the financial year ended 31 December 2018. This is attributed mainly to donations raised through the Charity Golf event, as well as receipt of Care & Share grant disbursement from NCSS (National Council of Social Service). Two fundraising events have been planned for 2019 to strengthen 70x7's financial position.

## EXPLANATION OF THE PURPOSES FOR WHICH THE CHARITY'S ASSETS ARE HELD

Passenger Van

The passenger van (purchased in 2016) was used mainly for:

- Ferrying
- ex-offenders and their family members to their home, halfway houses or for other purposes
- children of ex-offenders to and from home for Care Club, KayCan and other activities
- staff and volunteers for various activities
- Home visits and delivery of donated food or other items to beneficiaries
- Transport for festive celebrations, camps and other activities



70x7 intends to fund more pro-social, non-religious work amongst those whose lives have been affected by crime.

#### HIGHLIGHTS:

- •If given the opportunity, to continue the VEP run in prison
- •Continue to support ex-offenders by equipping them with necessary skills, assist in job placements, and in meeting their social needs
- •To enhance the Prison Gate programme to boost the number of ex-offenders who will consider joining the support group activities
- •To plan new In-Care programmes that will reach more of the prison population
- •To continue reaching out to the families of inmates through the Family Care Ministry
- •To plan two fundraising events
- •Becoming more involved with other rehabilitative agencies and partners such as the CARE network
